The Season of Creation runs from 1 September until 4 October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi.

It is a time of ecumenical celebration when we reflect on God's generosity in giving us our beautiful world and we are inspired to protect it. Modern media have given us an unrivalled opportunity to see the huge diversity of landscapes,

flora and fauna on the planet but, equally, they have shown us the devastation that has occurred when we have taken it for granted. The theme this year is "To hope and act with Creation" is inspired by Romans 8:19-25. This biblical image pictures the Earth as a Mother, groaning as in childbirth. Saint Francis of Assisi understood this when he referred to the Earth as our Sister and our Mother in his Canticle. Today, we no longer see the Earth as a gift from our Creator, but rather as a resource to be used. "Creation is groaning" (Rom 8:22) because of our selfishness and our unsustainable actions that harm her. Performance lasts approx. 1 hour – with a Q and A and refreshments afterwards



HIROSHIMA by John Hersey



During World War II, John Hersey as Newsweekly correspondent covered the fighting in Europe and Asia. He wrote articles for Time and Life magazines.

After the war, during the winter of 1945–46, Hersey was in Japan, reporting for The New Yorker on the reconstruction of the devastated country, when he found a document written by a Jesuit missionary who had survived the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. The journalist visited the missionary, who introduced him to other survivors

In May 1946, Hersey travelled to Japan, where he spent three weeks doing research and interviewing survivors. He returned to America during late June and began writing the stories of six Hiroshima survivors: a German Jesuit priest, a widowed seamstress, two doctors, a minister, and a young woman who worked in a factory.

The resulting piece was his most notable work, the 31,000-word article "Hiroshima", which was published in the August 31, 1946, issue of The New Yorker. The story dealt with the atomic bomb dropped on that Japanese city on August 6, 1945, and its effects on the six survivors. The article occupied almost the entire issue of the magazine – something The New Yorker had never done before.


ATOMIC PEOPLE - the film

The decision by the United States to drop atomic bombs on Hiroshima on 6 August 1945 and Nagasaki three days later - was one of the most momentous and destructive in world history. Now, nearly 80 years later, this unique film gathers the testimonies of some of the last



'Hibakusha' (survivors of the two atomic bombs) before their voices are lost forever. With an average age of 85, most Hibakusha were children when the bombs were dropped. Combining their personal accounts with archive footage, the film features a significant number of voices from this shrinking group, the only people left on earth to have survived a nuclear bomb, while exploring how their experiences continue to affect them to this day.



WAR HEADS TO WINDMILLS: Preventing Climate Catastrophe and Nuclear War by Timmon Wallis (Indispensable press) £13.99 from the Quaker Bookshop

To survive the climate crisis, we need money, brainpower and infrastructure for the most effective climate solutions. Those resources are currently being squandered by the nuclear weapons industry. We'll also need the world's biggest greenhouse gas emitters to stop pointing nuclear missiles at each other and start building unprecedented global cooperation. Can we "feed two birds with one scone" by converting assets from nuclear weapons of mass extinction to evidence-based climate solutions?

There are already excellent pathways to global nuclear disarmament. There are already excellent alternatives to burning fossil fuels. The obstacles are misinformation, propaganda, and politicians

corrupted by profiteering corporations. This book is a tool kit for campaigners on both issues to work together on treaties, divestment, boycotts, lobbying, legislation, education, conversion and more. It debunks myths, frauds, and distractions. It's full of well-documented facts and figures, tools and strategies, personal and political inspiration for swift, decisive action.

REPORT ON PAX CHRISTI A.G.M. 2024 on Saturday 1st June at the Quaker Meeting House, Liverpool and online through Zoom

As a theme for the day, we took 'Sumud', the Palestinian concept of steadfastness, resilience and perseverance, often expressed in Palestine as 'to exist is to resist'.

In his report to the meeting, Andrew Jackson, Chief Executive, reminded members of the vision around which they had all come together in joining the movement – a world where people can live in peace, without fear of violence in any form. He said that the strategy for Pax Christ remained as it had been – focused on communicating and embodying Gospel nonviolence in a lifestyle of active nonviolence. Work in peace education with schools and young people would continue to be fundamental.

To those who are wounded, bring healing, to those who hunger, the nourishment they need; to those bewildered, give boundaries, a sense of direction, deep meaning.


To those who trust in the power of arms, give signs of true strength; to those who reach out to the helpless, the endurance not to give up.

Ann Farr and Joan Sharples who have both retired were thanked for all their service over the last few years as Chair and Vice Chair.

Our current President, Archbishop Malcolm McMahon OP also announced his retirement after serving for over 20 years in that role. He told the meeting how profoundly influenced he had been by Pax Christi and, in particular, by Bruce Kent. He said it had been a privilege and very humbling to have been asked to preside over his funeral mass.

PARTNERSHIPS AT PLACEIN PENDLE

A previous observation as to the willingness of public sector partners to work with the 'faith sector' (the "F" in the VCFSE (Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise)*, is playing out in practice in East Lancashire. In Pendle, a small pot of funding from the Lancashire and South Cumbria ICB (Integrated Care Board) has allowed for a pilot project to be carried out, detailing the various types of provision and support which the faith sector is making.

This involved an initial mapping of what is being provided by churches, and mosques, in three specific areas – mental health; food security; family support. The data populates a spreadsheet, which in turn generates an interactive map – the one for food can be seen with this link: Pendle Churches Food Provision Mapping – Google My Maps

The mapping was followed by a breakfast meeting of church representatives with public sector leads, sharing the mapping information, and establishing new relationships.

Since then, a third stage in the process is happening, with more representation from the faith sector at Family Hub network meetings (see Spring Mouthpeace)*, and at community network meetings (in Pendle, this forum is called 'People of Pendle' and is convened by the CVS).



This work has been carried out in collaboration with Rev Mark Cowling (centre of picture) of the Gather Movement. Gather works to bring about 'transformation of towns and cities – socially, culturally and spiritually'. Crucial to this is a fourth stage – to bring together a small steering group of church leaders as the beginning of a Unity network. This is the stage reached with the work in Pendle. Engagement by anyone from Catholic churches in the Pendle district would be particularly welcomed.

The stages of this partnership process piloted in Pendle are now also starting to happen in Burnley and the Ribble Valley. We want to engage ALL churches in this process. If you can provide the contact details of any of your churches, please do get in touch.

MYAMAR - BURMA - A TRANSISTION TO DEMOCRACY?

After six decades of military rule and five years when the pro-democracy party the National League for Democracy (NDL) shared power with the military, in February 2021 the Burmese military launched another coup planning to retake direct control of the country.

Thanks to the resistance of the people of Burma, using a combination of armed struggle, strikes, peaceful protest, and economic boycotts, that plan failed. For the first time since seizing power in 1962, the military are in a fight for their survival, losing control of more terrrtory every day. In response, the military have been waging a brutal war against the people, killing thousands, bombing homes, schools and hospitals, and forcing almost 3 million people to flee their homes. 20,000 political prisoners are in jail. In areas freed from military control, new administrations are being established to provide services to local people. But the Burmese military continues to receive significant revenue, arms and equipment from overseas, helping to prolong its survival.

Burma Campaign UK is part of a global movement working for the promotion of human rights, democracy and development in Burma. We play a crucial role in coordinating the international campaign for human rights in Burma and work closely with human rights activists in Burma and in exile. Anna Roberts Executive Director of the Burma Campaign UK writes in the latest Burma Campaign News:

As the conflict in Burma continues, people in Burma are paying a very high price for the inaction of the international community. The British government response to the crisis has slowed to almost a standstill. With a new government, we now have an opportunity to revitalise the British government response to the crisis in Burma. With your help, we will be taking action to persuade our new government to speed up sanctions, to cut the financial lifeline to the military and increase humanitarian support, working with local civil society and others to ensure it reaches people in areas not under Burmese military control.

WHAT NEXT FOR BURMA? Mark Farmaner, Director of Burma Campaign UK writes:

During the years Aung San Suu Kyi spent under house arrest, the broad expectation was that one day the military would either be overthrown or agree to a transition to democracy. The expectation was that there would finally be a NLD government, led by Aung San Suu Kyi, and that this central government would seek to end human rights violations and address the legitimate demands of Burma's ethnic groups for greater rights and autonomy.

When the so-called reform process began after the 2010 elections, many believed that the longed-for democratic transition was finally happening. However, the top- down military imposed process was never about a genuine transition to democracy. It was about a weakened military seeking to preserve its power and wealth.

The NLD-led government that took power in 2016 was forced to share power with the military. Sadly, this system also exposed authoritarian tendencies within the NLD. Defenders of Aung San Suu Kyi and the NLD argue that they were constrained by the military from making positive changes. However, there were many examples of areas within the NLD's power where they either failed to make changes or actively implemented authoritarian policies, and, most notoriously, voluntarily and vigorously defended and justified genocide of the Rohingya. Based on our own conversations with senior NLD leaders, there was little chance that the leadership of the NLD really understood or would act on rights and protections for ethnic and religious groups or deliver any significant autonomy.

Burma must stay BuddhistPractical progress on this issue is essential. The root cause of military rule in Burma has never been about a 'bad' military and a 'good' democracy movement. It is about the refusal to accept Burma as a multi-ethnic multi- religious country. The view of the military, and many NLD leaders, has been that Burma is and must remain a Buddhist country of the biggest ethnicity in Burma, the Bamar.

In 2021 the military launched yet another coup, seeking to retake complete control of the country. Following the crushing of peaceful protests, armed struggle has become the main route through which the people of Burma are seeking to win their freedom.

Many young people from the cities and central Burma escaped to predominantly ethnic states on the borders of Burma. Many ethnic armed groups operate in these states, some controlling their own territory and running their own administrations to provide services such as health and education. Most took in these young people, and provided those who wanted it with military training to set up People's Defence Forces (PDFs). The combined forces of ethnic armies and new PDFs have surprised the world, and especially the Burmese military, with the progress they have made in freeing large swathes of Burma from military occupation.

For decades the British government, all governments, have operated on the false assumption that the Burmese military are invincible, so they have always pushed the people of Burma to compromise with their oppressor. Now, for the first time, they are thinking seriously about the possibility that the military might be defeated, and what comes after. The mindset of all national governments, which are central governments, is that a strong central government is essential. They fear now that if the military are defeated, Burma could break up, with ethnic groups declaring independence. Or they fear a failed state with different fiefdoms and warlordism.

This fear drives countries, especially neighbouring countries, to look at the military as a force for stability and keeping Burma together. This is one of several reasons why so many of Burma's neighbours arm and support the military, rather than side with the democracy movement.

The National Unity Government (NUG), which was formed by MPs, activists and ethnic representatives after the coup, has ministers beyond just NLD members and widespread popular support in Burma. Many PDFs are aligned to it. However, the international community is skeptical about its ability to establish a strong central government if the military is defeated.

The pattern emerging is that ethnic armies, often fighting alongside PDFs, are expanding the areas under their control, taking bases and territory from the military. They then start the process of extending their own administrative systems and laws.

The expectation that a strong central government would devolve power to ethnic states, handing over some power or autonomy, has been reversed. Ethnic armed organisations are taking back territory and power. With more territory, they are gaining access to more resources and becoming more powerful militarily and politically. In many areas the NUG needs the support and cooperation of the ethnic armies, and permission to operate in their areas, rather than the other way round. Governments are now stepping up engagement with ethnic armed groups, in addition to the NUG, belatedly recognising that they are key players in building a stable democratic Burma.

However, to describe the situation as incredibly complex would be an understatement. Different ethnic armed groups are not homogenous in their approach to human rights and democracy.

Some ethnic armed groups can genuinely claim to be a legitmate representative of their ethnic group, and want to see a stable, democratic Burma where human rights are respected. Some are like smaller ethnic versions of the Burmese military, wanting autonomy for their state and ethnic group, but are authoritarian, and hostile to some ethnic and/or religious minorities within their territory. Some are not much more than criinal gangs, with a long history of involvement in drugs, illegal gambling, human trafficking and other crimes, in co-operation with the Burmese military.

A significant new development has been the rise of armed resistance groups, PDFs, non-ethnic central Burma states particularly in Magway and Sagaing Regions in the north. In these regions numerous PDFs operate, some aligned to the NUG, some to ethnic armed organisations, or both, and some operating independently, Again, there are big differences in how they operate and their respect for human rights.

Looking at this situation, on the surface, it may be understandable why there are fears of Burma disintegrating or failing as a state, of warlordism and ongoing conflict. The answer though, isn't to throw a lifeline to the Burmese military which created this crisi in the first place. Despite the great challenges, no-one that Burma Campaign UK has spoken to in our recent trips to Burma and its borders thinks the military can in any way be part of the solution. Instead, people are working on building their own ground- up solutions. In Karenni State different armed groups, PDFs, political parties and civil society groups have come together to form an Interim Executive Committee to collaborate in running the state, which has been mostly freed from military rule. In Karen State the dominant Karen National Union is taking steps to engage with the different ethnic and religious communities in the new areas under its control, and working with the NUG and other ethnic armed groups on proposals for the future of the country seeking unity not just in opposition to the military, but for a positive vision of what replaces the military. Given the legacy of decades of military rule, Burma faces challenges like no other. Removing the military is already an incredible challenge. Rebuilding afterwards will be just as challenging. As one activist put it, it will be messy and painful, but we have no other choice.

The people of Burma will need international support to achieve a transition to democracy, not to be pressured into a deal with the military which may produce a brief short-term stability, at the price of long-term conflict, human rights violations and instability.

It may prove to be that the process of self-won devolution, with any dialogue on the future of Burma beginning from such a position of strength for ethnic groups, could, in the long- term, deliver a more stable outcome for the country than previous expectations of a democratically elected central government devolving power.

With the new government, we now have a new opportunity to revitalise the British government response to the crisis. Please write to the new British Foreign Secretary David Lammy, calling on him to urgently speed up and scale up the British government response to the situation in Burma. Key points to include in your letter......

The British government must: Sanction Burmese and international companies involved in supplying jet fuel to the military. Sanction Burmese state- owned banks used by the military to purchase arms and receive revenue.

Triple UK aid to Burma, working with local civil society and others to ensure it reaches people in areas not under Burmese military control.

Expel the Burmese military attache from the UK. The Burmese military are not welcome in the UK.

Report on 'JUST POLITICS' the Annual J & P Conference at Swanwick 19 -21st July 2024



Marian Thompson writes:

"When we started planning this Conference we were expecting a General Election in the Autumn/Winter 2024/5 but events have overtaken us" Anne Peacey Chair of NJPN explained as she welcomed us on the first evening just two weeks after the General Election.

John Battle who was chairing the conference suggested it was good after the intensity of the General Election to reclaim the politics of everyday life. He thought the election campaign narrative was

dominated by the media and had lacked vision. It was good to have a time to reflect on the way forward. He suggested that our job in our workshops was to work on achieving practical hope reminding us of the Seamus Heaney quote that 'Hope has two

beautiful daughters, anger and courage' Maybe it is time to let go of the anger?

The key note speaker on the Friday night was Right Reverend Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford and member of the House of Lords.

She suggested 'Just Politics' offered a spectrum. At one end is a politics of integrity that pursues Christlike justice and at the other end is a shrug of the shoulder 'Oh it's just politics' somehing hardly worth engaging with. Bishop Guli in her talk discussed how we transform the indifference of merely politics into the pursuit of a truly just politics. She also asked how the church should be involved in this change? What can the church offer politics?

The bishop thought there were tensions which we as church and as individuals had to consider in trying to shape politics in a just Christlike way: for instance how to be renewed and relevent while maintaining a theological and moral constancy. Can we be flexible, open and ready to

listen and maybe to change yet remain true to strongly held convictions. Can we disagree well? The bishop saw the need to develop a shared language to help and also to step ouside the four walls of a building or larger institutional structure whether our church communities or 'the Westminster village'

Developing these themes with personal examples Bishop Guli concluded that perhaps she was wrong pitching the church against politics and asking what one can offer the other. The work of the church seeking justice and peace, freeing the captive and bringing good news to the poor is inherently political. To seek the kingdom of God is a bold political choice.

On Saturday morning Molly Scott Cato, Professor Emerita of Green Economics and finance and economy spokesperson for the Green Party developed the theme of the importance of democracy. She wondered how we can embrace those who do not share our views? How do we disagree constuctively? She was concerned that when canvassing people were saying 'I don't believe in democracy' and that passions could run high. She reminded us of the Lao Tzu saying 'Do you have the patience to wait until your mud settlers and the water is clear'

In the afternoon speaker was Steve Whiting, a Quaker who has worked on peace projects and the nonviolence training programme 'Turning the Tide'. Steve talked of the relationships between business with its aim to make profit, the government and civil society aiming at the common good. He asked us to consider how we change power that causes injustice and how to do it nonviolently.

'Politics is noble: it is one of the highest forms of charity, as Paul VI used to say. We sully it when we mix it with business. The relationship between the Church and political power can also be corrupted if the common good is not the only converging point'. Pope Francis 'the Joy of the Gospel'

On Saturday evening there was was a real cause for hope for the future. In the 'Just Politics: Perspectives from Emerging Leaders' session eight young people took to the stage and answered questions – first those they had preapared themselves and then taking questions from the floor. Their thoughtful, understanding answers were refreshing, encouraging and at times inspiring. Several of them had been coming to Swanwick over the years with their families and enjoyed the children's sessions. But they had obviously learnt as well. Several referred to Catholic Social Teaching... "Activism and my faith are completely intertwined..." one said. "I strongly believe in a preferential option for the poor and the Common Good," another commented. But they also called for a more inclusive, welcoming, caring, listening

church. One young woman said she hoped to see women's ordination, and greater LGBT+ rights. Several voiced concern for the environment and world peace. One young person pointed out how dull church can be sometimes. We have such a Good News story - church should be more joyful, more "fun" she said. The group received a standing ovation at the end of their session.

On Sunday morning Fr Chris Hughes, a priest in the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle was joined by Sara Bryson of Citizens UK*. They talked about community organising in Tyne and Wear. Civil society can be quite divided but this is a way of bringing various community groups together to negotiate. Fr Chris likened it to the Vatican II idea of pilgrims journeying together.

One of the things Citizens UK is concerned about is payment of the Real Living Wage to all workers. Fr Chris mentioned only 7 Catholic Dioceses paid this to their employees. These were, Westminster, Brentwood, Birmingham, Salford, Hexham and Newcastle, and Cardiff. He suggested when we returned home we could perhaps write to theBishops Conference about this. We were then encouraged to form into groups to discuss a way forward. A group containing members of Lancaster, Liverpool and Shrewsbury Dioceses formed and we noted that none of our Dioceses paid the real living wage. https://www.livingwage.org.uk/what-real-living-wage?

While at Swanwick we were fortunate to have the chance to spend time with 'PASSION FOR CHANGE'

This is an exhibition of sculptures and poems that connects the Passion of Christ with the suffering of all living beings in our world. The aim of the exhibition is to invite people to reflect on these connections and how they can help us to work for a just and compassionate world for all, especially the poor and powerless. It thus answers the call in Laudato Si' that 'the cry of the earth is the cry of the poor'.

The exhibition, which is supported by the Passionist Community, comprises a number of 'Stations'. Each one is made up of a sculpture, a poem, and quotes from Scripture and from Laudato Si'.
