# LET US PRAY ADVENT

## WEEK 1: HOPE

### INTRODUCTION

This is the first of four weekly meetings to help us prepare to welcome the Christ child into our hearts this Christmas.

The purpose of the sessions is to offer an oasis of peace and friendship amidst the busyness of all that is going on at this time of year and an opportunity to pray and reflect together on what Christ's presence in our world of today means for us. What are the comforts and challenges of that knowledge?

As we journey together over four weeks, we will seek to deepen our relationship with the God who loves and cares for us, as we prepare to welcome the Christ child who brings the gifts of hope, peace, joy and love.

The sessions will be based around those four themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love and will include music; art; readings from scripture and/or spiritual writers; a period of guided prayer/reflection, with opportunities to experience different ways of praying; and some questions for discussion, to challenge us to explore our faith a little more deeply and to grow as we journey together this Advent. Each session will also end with a further short period of prayer.

The theme of this first session is Hope.

Our first hope is that you will find this a welcoming space for us to pray, to imagine, to rest, and to dream as we contemplate hope in our own lives – where we find hope, what questions hope holds, and how it invites us to engage with the wider world.

#### WAITING AND WATCHING

Advent is about two comings. It's about waiting and watching for the coming of the Christ child – new life, new birth, new hope coming into our world and into our lives. It is the fulfilment of God's promises. But it's also about waiting and watching for the end times when the fullness of God's kingdom will be revealed. Both these advents signify the coming together of humanity and divinity.

We are called to prepare the way of the Lord. We watch and reflect on who we are. We live with expectancy and anticipation of God's presence in our lives.

#### JOURNEYING TOGETHER

#### **MEETING GOD IN THE SILENCE**
