CEASEFIRE IN GAZA

We have been praying and pleading for a ceasefire for months. Now that it seems a ceasefire is about to take place, I am overwhelmed with mixed and contradictory emotions. To begin with, I am still cautious: I will believe it when I see it. But, hoping that the ceasefire materializes, we can't but feel relieved and grateful. Gaza has endured immense suffering, with far too many lives lost. At this moment, we just want the killing to stop. I am also grateful for all who will be set free, Palestinians and Israelis alike. I hope and pray that we reach a point in which all captives are set free.

While a ceasefire is certainly something to celebrate, it cannot be our goal. This is not a moment to rest. Too many questions are still unanswered. Too many wounds are not healed. Will the rebuilding begin, and especially that of hospitals? Will sufficient food and medical aid enter Gaza? Will doctors and nurses be allowed to enter Gaza and nurse the thousands who need immediate support? Will those who suffered and lost their loved ones find comfort? What about the thousands with imputed body parts? What about the two million refugees? Is the ceasefire temporary, or will the fighting and shelling resume?

We are left with so many uncertainties and questions about the immediate future, both in Gaza and the West Bank. Moreover: will those who committed war crimes ever be held accountable? At the same time, we can't help but feel angry and frustrated that it took this long. Gazans have suffered a lot. They deserve to simply live in their homeland. Palestinians deserve to live in dignity and peace in their homeland.

A ceasefire will not end apartheid. Annexation in the West Bank is already taking place. Our land, ruled by racists, is fragmented and torn apart by checkpoint, settlements, and segregation policies. A ceasefire is certainly something to celebrate and thank God for. Every life saved and every soul set free is something to celebrate. Every life matters. So, we feel grateful today, remembering that a ceasefire is not the goal. Will there ever be an end to this 76-year-old nightmare? Let it be our commitment.

But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream (Amos 5:24)

GAZA: CEASEFIRE MUST LEAD TO LASTING TRUCE AND MASSIVE AID EXPANSION

January 16, 2025: Statement from Jan Egeland, Secretary General of the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) following the announcement of a ceasefire deal between Israel and Hamas: "At long last we have a deal that must end the 15 months of relentless death, destruction, displacement, detention, and the holding of hostages. This ceasefire must be the foundation for an enduring truce that can pave the way for peace and human rights for long-suffering civilian populations. Israel must immediately lift all restrictions on aid and humanitarian agencies to avert famine-like conditions and ensure access to shelter, food, and medical care for all in need. Hamas and other armed groups must meet their commitments and release the hostages without delay.

"The vast majority of homes in Gaza are destroyed or damaged. These must be repaired and rebuilt along with schools, hospitals and other destroyed civilian infrastructure. The unprecedented devastation requires massive and immediate international relief and rehabilitation, beginning with this ceasefire. We call on the United States, Germany, the United Kingdom and other nations to make sure Israel does keep all crossings open, enabling a sustained flow of aid that can alleviate further suffering.

"These hostilities have destabilised the Middle East and exposed millions of civilians to unrelenting violence. The Gaza ceasefire must not only introduce a lasting cessation of hostilities, but a firm commitment to international law, including accountability for war crimes. To end the cycle of violence, the international community must address the root causes of this decades-long conflict and pursue a just resolution in alignment with international law. NRC's courageous teams on the ground in Gaza are prepared to scale up our efforts, helping families begin the long process of rebuilding their lives."

THE BALFOUR PROJECT REACTION TO THE GAZA CEASEFIRE PLAN

A retired Israeli General was interviewed just before me, and I responded. I had planned to say more:

- Negotiation and international pressure can take us to a better place than war and war crimes;
- UNRWA must be given free access to deliver humanitarian aid in Gaza, and not banned as the Knesset wishes:
- The 1967 Occupation must end, as the 19 July Advisory Opinion of the International Court of Justice makes clear
- Palestinians have the same right to self-determination as Israelis
- The British Govt should now recognise both states, having recognised one (Israel) in 1950
- Mutual security between neighbours is ultimately the way forward, with international guarantees for both peoples
- There is a big role for Britain, using its convening capabilities and upholding accountability under international law in deed, not just in word, partnering France, Norway, Ireland, Spain, Australia and others.

There is more in the Balfour Project submission to the current inquiry by the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House of Commons, which we will share with you as soon as the Committee grants permission.

JOURNALS FROM JERUSALEM - January 18 DAY ONE

Today was spent visiting some of the holy sites in and around the Old City of Jerusalem associated with the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. These places are often bustling with Christian pilgrims but they have not been visiting over the past fifteen months because of the war, although small numbers have started to return more recently.

A memorable part of Day One was joining the Franciscans on the Via Dolorosa. Every Friday at 3pm they process and pray the Way of the Cross, walking the path Jesus took on Good Friday through the city from the Church of the Condemnation to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

We offered our prayers while following in the footsteps of Christ's Passion for peace and inside the basilica, in view of the empty tomb, lit candles praying that the light of hope may shine through the darkness.

JOURNALS FROM JERUSALEM - January 18 DAY 2: "WE REFUSE TO BE ENEMIES."

On Saturday we left our base in Jerusalem and travelled to the Bethlehem area. Firstly, to visit Tent of Nations, a farm southwest of Bethlehem owned by the Nassar family, and then onto Beit Jala to visit the Latin Patriarchal Seminary. The people we encountered gave first-hand accounts of the difficulties of daily life endured by Palestinians in the West Bank. Please continue reading to learn their stories which they have asked us to share.

Tent of Nations is a project ran on beautiful farmlands belonging to Daoud Nassar and his family who are natives of Bethlehem and Palestinian Christians. The Nassar family have owned, farmed and nurtured the land for more than a century and despite having documented proof that the land was purchased in 1916 by Daoud's grandfather, they are continuously resisting attempts by Israeli authorities to designate their farm as "state land". They have been engaged in back and forth legal battles in various courts for over 30 years.

At Tent of Nations they grow and harvest a variety of crops like olives, grapes, apricots and nuts. The farm is surrounded on all sides by Israeli settlements. The family face constant threats and intimidation from settlers who have destroyed their crops many times by cutting them down or setting them on fire, with the goal of forcing the Nassars to abandon their land.

Inspired by their Christian faith, Daoud and the Nassars are an inspirational example of non-violent resistance through their motto: "We refuse to be enemies." They continue to plant and harvest their crops, especially olive trees which are especially significant to Palestinian culture. They have hosted thousands of volunteers from many nations over the years who come in solidarity to provide an international presence (which helps lessen the incidents of settler violence), to give their time to help run the farm, and to witness, hear, and tell Daoud's story.

The Latin Patriarchal Seminary is home to around fifteen Arab Christian students who are studying to be diocesan priests. Their rector, Fr Bernard, provided a tour around the seminary telling us how they form men for the priesthood in the land where Jesus established the Church. On the roof terrace looking out over the surrounding villages, and with a view of the Separation Wall that surrounds the West Bank, he told us about how they have to ration their water supply every day.

Like all Palestinian properties in the West Bank, the seminary is forced to deal with restricted access to clean and safe water. The students have running water once a week. Restrictions on water provision by the Israeli authorities is a common occurrence for buildings on Palestinian land yet Israeli settlements in the West Bank have continuous access to clean, safe running water. When the water does come, it is not of a standard fit for human use. Fr Bernard further explained that recent tests on the tap water at the seminary identified harmful bacteria and some of the students have developed skin conditions on their scalps. One young man was treated earlier this year for a parasite in his liver which they believe was caused by the water.

These are the real stories from the real people who we met on Saturday. Their accounts mirror the accounts of many who are in much need for the realisation of justice and peace for all in The Holy Land.

BANK CLOSES ACCOUNT ON LOCAL CHARITY THE HANDS UP PROJECT

As news of a [Palestinian] ceasefire fills the media, Nick Bilbrough has been running the education project The Hands Up Project since 2015 and as an official Charity since 2016 – see:

When choosing a bank to work with it seemed logical to go with The Charities Aid Foundation (CAF). On their website it declares: "..working at the centre of the giving world. We help donors to give more impactfully and charities to build their resilience so they can do more of their life-changing work." https://www.cafonline.org/ Unfortunately for The Hands Up Project, who work a good deal (but not exclusively) with Palestine, it appears CAF doesn't want to be associated with the life-changing work of the Totnes Charity.

Obviously, The Hands Up Project's work has been profoundly affected by the War on Gaza. Nick Bilbrough cannot hide his deeply felt emotions during our conversation: "We've lost a lot – A LOT of people who work with the Hands Up Project – children, educators, and their families and there are many we have not heard from." Nick can only hope they are not dead.

As a bank, The Charities Aid Foundation have given 3 months' notice to close the account. Nick explains "It's not a big issue in itself, there are other banks. It's just another sign that we're on our own. I've lost faith in virtually all corporations." It might not be a big issue to the bank but it's a major setback for the project. All the fundraising, payments, taxation and day to day procedures now have to be modified and updated. A big issue if you're alone struggling to keep up with the emotion and hard-work of continuing the education work under seemingly impossible circumstances. It seems ludicrous to think that such a tiny outfit like Hands-Up might be funding terrorism or whatever it is that make CAF so reticent. Nick explains "This is going to entail a lot of work and take up time that I don't have. I'm an educator, not an accountant."

It seems reasonable that an organisation like CAF would want to satisfy itself that charities it works with, are acting responsibly and throughout the life of the project, Nick has been required to answer ongoing questions explaining transactions through the account to satisfy CAF that monies raised and used are legitimately used within the Hands Up Project. Hands-Up is now in Cairo, where using a 3 bedroomed flat, they have opened a temporary school to continue their work educating 20 children aged between 8 and 16 in English and Arabic.

It maybe the elimination of normalcy behind the bank closing on them. "it's impossible to pay through normal channels, and we're having to pay in cash." Whilst Egyptian locals have been welcoming and helpful, it seems authority and banks are less amenable to a migrants' situation. In the meantime, Donna Campbell has set up a crowdfunder to help with the Temporary Cairo School. https://www.justgiving.com/page/donna-campbell-1729961659486

There is also an even more urgent crowdfunder for Shaima, to help her to also escape Palestine. The Gaza Ceasefire

So what are Nick's feelings about the announced ceasefire? "Mixed, I'm afraid. Will Israel comply with all the agreements? They will almost certainly find excuses to break the deal." Less the 20 minutes after our conversation, Netanyahu does exactly this. He refuses, at time of writing, to ratify the agreement because he alleges Hamas are renaging already — see: https://www.politico.eu/article/benjamin-netanyahu-delays-vote-gaza-ceasefire-deal-accusing-hamas-last-minute-crisis/

Regardless of any agreements — last night there were further Israeli bombing attacks on Gaza — see: https://skwawkbox.org/2025/01/15/israel-already-breaking-ceasefire-deal-pounding-gaza-city-with-heavy-bombs/ ... "The ceasefire doesn't apply for days, they always do this and carry on with the killing in the meantime." Having spoken with Gazan's today, Nick says they are optimistic and delighted about the latest news but worry for those who will die before the ceasefire is implemented. Nick is also cautious but hopeful that the Rafah Border will re-open allowing Palestinians to leave and help to come in.

It seems Nick cannot wait to return to Gaza to resume the teaching support work on a deeply wounded country.

*ARTICLE: BEAUTIFUL RESISTANCE: THEATRE FROM GAZA NOW – WEDNESDAY, 22 MAY 2024

An evening of powerful storytelling and moving theatre performances from Gaza, showcasing the resilience of the human spirit with an illustrated talk by Nick Bilbrough, the founder of the educational charity Hands Up Project. Through its network of volunteers HUP connects children around the world with young people in Palestine. By means of online interaction, drama and storytelling activities, it fosters creativity and self-expression to promote mutual understanding, personal growth, and the development of English language skills.

The first play: It will be over soon is performed by children in a newly formed drama club in Jabalia camp, northern Gaza. The second play: I can 2024 is a remake of a winning play from the 2018 remote theatre competition, performed from their tents in Rafah.

Anne O'Connor writes: I joined Nick's moving presentation on Zoom. The children clearly enjoyed putting together their short plays which they performed in English. This was partly to improve their language skills but also, as we learnt in the Q and A, to give a degree of distance from the situation they are in – by using a language other than their own they can develop a new persona that takes them out of the horrors of war.

Basim, one of the winners of the drama competition of 2018, reprised his play 'I Can' for 2024, performing with the same two friends, standing together among the rubble. During the play he says: "we suffer but we are born again amidst the suffering. I can achieve anything."

The image (right) shows him with the words "I am a human" written across his arms. In the final frame of the film we see Nick and then other adults and children holding up their hands, palms facing, with the words "we can" written clearly.



The film then pans out to give smaller and smaller images of all the hands in one great montage, accompanied by rousing music. This scene had echoes of the closing credits of Richard Curtis' hit movie *Love Actually* which gives a similar focus on the power of love and solidarity. Basim concludes by saying: "Yes, I can. I am a human. I always knew you were with us, holding our dreams, listening, sharing our pain, wanting to help. It's not 'I am' anymore. It's 'We can.'

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: May 20, 2024 Heather Kiernan writes: Children in a besieged enclave write poems inspired by two paintings. They enter them for a competition and the competition poems are made into a book, complete with the two paintings and illustrations by the poets for their poems.

At least two of the children whose poems are in the book were killed while the others have been displaced. Meanwhile the poems, and the pictures, were made into an exhibition that is travelling to Edinburgh this week. At rallies and events supporting Palestine, and at openings of the exhibition, the poems are read out.

Fatema Saidam, killed last October aged nine, with her whole family, lies as dead as Homer and Sappho, and her words (now translated into many languages) are working in the world just like theirs:

Legs are for walking slowly And also run Hands are for shaking with friends Not for shooting gun

May 21, 2024 Heather writes: Yesterday I posted the poem of young Fatema who, along with her family was killed last October by an Israeli airstrike.

Today's poem is by 14-year-old Obada who also wrote his poem for the Hands Up poetry competition. He was killed last October in an Israeli airstrike. I was struck by the illustration that accompanies the poem. The words seem to emanate from a heart, almost medical in design. This is Obada's poem:

I always dream of a life Clear as the serenity of the sky. And a heart beating with love and optimism. Why our smiles don't bloom like the flowers?

Let us fly as freely as those butterflies ... Satisfied, colourful and flapping sky-high, Away from worries, anxieties and sorrow.

My darling's face is sad. The moon's face in our homeland is sad. Sad you are my city

- ... you the spring of tears and a long sad history

Your eyes have the green colour of olives and the blue colour of sea

... while the night falls over the face of life.

Darling: wipe out that sadness and weave the dress of impossible from the tears.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 18 -25 January

Heather Kiernan writes: Yehuda Amichai is considered by many to be Israel's greatest modern poet. Amichai expressed a profound connection between his love of living and day to day life with his yearning for peace. This yearning for peace accompanied him from the very beginning and was most significantly reflected in his life and poetry: "Men wear their first love and not battle decorations."

Amichai was not a political poet in the conventional sense but he continuously tried to understand the complicated world that we live in and reconcile between conflicting sides. In today's poem he writes: "May I have peace in the rest of my life... I don't want to fulfil my parents' prophecy that life is war."

I, MAY I REST IN PEACE ~Yehuda Amichai

(translated from the Hebrew by Chana Bloch & Chana Kronfeld)

I, may I rest in peace – I, who am still living, say, May I have peace in the rest of my life. I want peace right now while I'm still alive. I don't want to wait like that pious man who wished for one leg of the golden chair of Paradise, I want a four-legged chair right here, a plain wooden chair. I want the rest of my peace now. I have lived out my life in wars of every kind: battles without and within, close combat, face-to-face, the faces always my own, my lover-face, my enemy-face. Wars with the old weapons – sticks and stones, blunt axe, words, dull ripping knife, love and hate, and wars with newfangled weapons - machine gun, missile, words, land mines exploding, love and hate. I don't want to fulfil my parents' prophecy that life is war. I want peace with all my body and all my soul. Rest me in peace.

IAN LINDEN: RUSSIA'S & CHINA'S SCRAMBLE FOR AFRICA

7/1/2025: New Year's Eve was a slow news night. You could tell because a story about Africa was the BBC lead item. It sounded a bit like Schadenfreude: The Ivory Coast and Senegal had told their longstanding French garrisons, in the nicest possible way, to pack up and go home. Both countries have important economic links with France. French troops had previously been told to leave Niger, Burkina Faso, and Mali where they had been fighting jihadists. An opportunity not to be missed.

During Prime Minister John Major's entente cordiale with President Chirac in 1995, I attended a joint meeting on Africa, not much publicized, held in Paris. Apart from the fabulous, ever more sumptuous connecting rooms, ornate Louis XV furniture, and some threatening chandeliers – the venue was the Elyseé Palace – the most notable feature was a difference between the delegations. We Brits were a motley crew of anthropologists, NGO-bodies involved in international development, civil servants from FCO and DfID (now absorbed by the Foreign Office), plus the odd intelligence officer. The French partially matched these, but, pursuing their own priorities, fielded an impressive array of military figures. The colonial Tirailleurs Sénégalais formed in 1857 who fought on the Western Front during the First World War reflect a long and deep relationship. The expulsion of the French armed forces from West Africa is an historic blow to President Macron who cherishes his role in international affairs.

The expulsion of the French was also a significant sign of the times. The Russians' arms-length mercenaries, the Wagner group, moved into the Central African Republic in 2017 where they brokered a peace agreement between the warring factions — which later fell apart. In North Africa after the fall of Gaddafi, they began operating with 'Marshal' Khalifa Haftar's militia in Benghazi, Libya, in 2018. Support of West African military juntas came next beginning in 2021 with Mali in where in 2022 they contributed to the execution in the Mopti region of some 500 people by the Malian armed forces. Then in 2024 Wagner was invited into Burkina Faso and Niger. Wagner, recently renamed the Africa Corps, is now under the Russian Ministry of Defence. Africa is becoming a Syria-substitute playground for Russia and Putin.

The Mali story is extraordinary. The towns of Timbuktu and Gao are on the desert-edge in the Bilad-al-Sudan (from the medieval 'land of the blacks') that extends east as far as Darfur in Sudan. They are major targets for jihadist Al-Qaeda and ISIS linked groups and so in turn targets for the Wagner group. In Mali's North-East Tinzaouten province abutting the Algerian border, a separatist coalition of nomadic Tuareg has on occasion been aligned with jihadists against the junta forces. The Tuareg are known as horsemen and cattle herders whose men famously wear a face-covering. They suffer particularly from the climate induced encroachment of the Sahara. Le Monde has been reporting on Ukraine's support for the Tuareg coalition against the Russian mercenaries. In July 2024, 84 Russians and 47 Malians were reported killed in a Tuareg attack involving light quadcopter drones supplied allegedly – Kyiv denies this – by Ukraine. Well, my enemy's enemy is my friend.

A further chapter in the Scramble for Africa has opened. This time it's Russia and China. There is something almost fitting that the two vast militarized authoritarian giants wish to engage with more or less militarized, authoritarian regimes in Africa. From Grozny to Gao jihadism is a menace, and from Beijing to Bamako railways and infrastructure are basic to economic progress. Russia and China seek Africa's rare minerals and metals, gold and diamonds, cashew nuts and cocoa. Gold remains a lure. It is estimated that Russia has been taking out £1 billion worth of gold each year from African countries. The Wagner mercenaries took over a gold mine in Mali only last year.

Everything in the West African garden wasn't lovely before the new arrivals (the Chinese not so new). The northern borders of these West African states are highly permeable to people, weapons and smuggled goods. Travel north west from Maroua in Cameroon, you aren't far from Maiduguri in Nigeria, birthplace in 2009 of militant Boko Haram which forged links with ISIS and, in 2015, sought to form a Caliphate. Travel north east to the capital of Chad, N'Djamena, and you go through territory infested with militia of the Islamic State in West Africa, and the remains of Boko Haram. Go south you have miles of border with Nigeria, a smugglers paradise for vehicles and arms. And since 2018 there has been a debilitating civil war in Cameroon.

Failure both to alleviate poverty and command the confidence of citizens are contributory causes of jihadism. The high-flown titles of such armed groups can give a false impression. The foot soldiers of such militias have little knowledge of Shari'a and the Qur'an. They are in the employ of better educated jihadists, given a Kalashnikov, earn a living and eventually can pay the bride-price for a wife. The corruption in African States, the siphoning off of national wealth, the absence of reward for competence and merit, is not news to their citizens. I was being driven south from Makeni to Freetown in Sierra Leone and noticed a new railway running parallel with the road "Where does that go," I asked the driver. "Beijing" he replied. I could see him grinning in the rear-view mirror.

Neither Russia nor China are particularly bothered by the high level of corruption in sub-Saharan Africa. Russia's kleptocrats would find it amateurish. Transparency International's Corruption Perception Index is a standard measure of public sector corrupt practice. The lower the score the higher the corruption. Denmark does best with 90. But 44 out of 49 sub-Saharan African countries score below 50. Nigeria gets 24, Cote d'Ivoire with 40. Botswana, something of a worthy exception at 60. To Russia and China diplomatic support, for example at the UN, and valuable, often scarce, commodities, are what matters from client states.

In the face of the deteriorating situation in West Afrika, and economic pressures in Europe, not a great deal is currently to be expected from either the UK and the EU. It is true that since 2015, there have been British troops training the Nigerian army, and personnel advising on counter-terrorism in North-East Nigeria, the Chad Basin and Cameroon in response to the ISIS threat in the region. There has also been some police training. But both the EU and UK, by cutting spending on Aid, are simultaneously undermining their own soft power and weakening the challenge to poverty. A great deal of the UK Aid budget is now diverted from poverty reduction abroad to covering the cost of asylum seekers in UK, including hotel accommodation, or on stimulating and facilitating trade. This as climate change brings ever severer immiseration to millions.

The current, declining, birth rate in Africa is 31 per 1,000 people. Though, the UN estimates, there will be 2.5 billion Africans by 2050, making up a quarter of the world's population. There is need to focus a little creative attention and action on this great continent beyond Schadenfreude at France's reverses. 'Waging Peace, Fighting Disease and Building Hope' - the Motto of the Carter Center in Atlanta, founded by the late President, would be a good start. https://www.ianlinden.com/latest-blogs/russias-chinas-scramble-for-africa

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS PREPARE TO CELEBRATE THE LAUNCH OF JUBILEE 2025 AS PILGRIMS OF HOPE

January 17, 2025: On Friday 24 January Catholic schools across England and Wales will join together to celebrate Jubilee Launch Day for Schools, as children and young people embark on a journey as "pilgrims of hope". Cardinal Vincent Nichols has prepared an inspiring video message to be shared as part of the event. The Catholic Education Service, CAFOD and Catholic Social Action Network are working in partnership, together with the Catholic Youth Ministry Federation, to provide this framework of events and resources to all Catholic schools. The Chair of the Catholic Education Service, Rt. Rev. Marcus Stock, has written to all Catholic schools inviting them to participate in Jubilee for Schools. He says, "The theme of Jubilee 2025 is 'Hope', the hope that comes from knowing we are loved by God, the hope we can bring to those in most need, and the hope we can bring to our common home, the earth."

During the Jubilee 2025 – Year of Hope, the whole Catholic school community is invited to stand in solidarity with people around the world suffering the effects of poverty, injustice and conflict; sharing a hope rooted in love; deepening faith and taking action to build a better world for everyone. Thousands of prayer cards and resources have been sent out, and Jubilee witness banners for the school gates are appearing across the country.

St Wilfrid's Catholic Primary School in Hartford, Cheshire is one of those taking part in the Jubilee celebrations. They already have their banner on the school gate. Headteacher, Justine McEniff, said: "We, the children and staff at St Wilfrid's are excited to begin our Jubilee journey as agents of change. We are looking forward to joining the launch assembly and celebrating through prayers and actions throughout the year."

A special film produced for Launch Day will be available online, including the message from Cardinal Vincent Nichols, voices of hope from children and young people, and ways to put faith into action. A key resource for schools is the interactive Jubilee Journey Map, helping the whole school community to explore the theme of hope, and to work towards the Jubilee Pledge Day in the summer.

Monica Conmee, Head of Education at CAFOD, said "Pope Francis asks us to be signs of hope for others, by putting Catholic Social Teaching into action. Children and young people have a vital role in this, joining together to make change happen, bringing signs of hope to an unfair world. VOCATION FOR JUSTICE: RESPONDING WITH HOPE

Ellen Teague Jan18, 2025: An introduction to the Spring 2025 newsletter of the Columban Justice, Peace and Ecology Team as 'Vocation for Justice' enters its 39th year! The 2025 Jubilee is the third that I have prepared for.

My first was in 1986 when I worked for CAFOD, and it was celebrating its 25th anniversary. How many remember CAFOD taking over the Royal Festival Hall for a day and the diminutive Dom Heider Camara from Brazil being a keynote speaker. Dressed in a simple beige cassock, he seemed to have stepped out of his famous CAFOD poster, "When I feed the poor, they call me a saint. When I ask why the poor have no food, they call me a communist". Barely five feet tall, he was a giant in terms of implementing the Church's Social Teaching, particularly the 'Option for the Poor'. As Archbishop of Olinda and Recife, Camera abandoned the archbishop's palace for a modest house, warning, "be careful of the way you live, it is the only gospel most people will ever read!" He gave away Church land to landless people and set up a Justice and Peace Commission.

His talk received a standing ovation from the thousands present, deeply touched by his holiness, warmth and joy. He smiled the whole day and greeted everyone near him. In fact, his is the only hug I have ever received from an archbishop!

CAFOD also ran a three-year development education campaign on the Jubilee themes of Land, Debt, and Slavery. And these featured in my second Jubilee celebration: the Great Jubilee of 2000. CAFOD's 1999 preparatory Conference at Ushaw College looked at the social justice elements of Jubilee and Bernadette Farrell's popular Jubilee Song was written for that conference.

From 1997 the National Justice and Peace Network ran a three-year conference programme based on the papal letter The Coming of the Third Millennium and its call for the cancellation of debt. Columban Ed O'Connell helped to provide a popular version of the document. Then, Columbans were among Jubilee 2000 supporters who formed human chains to lobby world leaders meeting in Birmingham and Cologne in 1998 and 1999. The Churches wanted the Millennium celebration to have a strong ethical dimension.

And here we go again. The 2025 Holy Year offers another opportunity to renew our commitment to Christ and to renew society. Laudate Deum, released last October, reminded of the urgency of the Laudato Si' message - marking 10 years in May - and the need for both personal and cultural transformation to address ecological and climate crises.

Debt cancellation is a key theme of Jubilee 2025. Yet, we know that debt remission will not on its own end poverty, that structural injustice inherent in the world's financial architecture must also be addressed. We are also more alert to intergenerational injustice because of the challenges of worsening human-caused climate change, diminishing biodiversity and our polluted water systems.

This newsletter picks up on these issues for the year ahead and linking into the Columban mission priorities of Migrants and Biodiversity, chosen at last year's Columban General Assembly. But our overarching theme is Hope, following the lead of Pope Francis, and following on the Autumn 2024 'Vocation for Justice' which looked at 'Jubilee: Pilgrims of Hope'. Pope Francis has said that Hope, "is the most beautiful gift that the Church can give to all of humanity." And he added, "Christians cannot be satisfied with having hope" but must also "radiate hope."

The newsletter centrespread. 'Hope: A Gift and a Duty' was written by Anna Blackman, a Lecturer in Catholic Religious Education at the University of Glasgow and a member of the Columban Justice, Peace and Ecology Team. She says: "The social dimension of hope is inherent throughout Catholic social thought and practice. The social encyclicals are filled with the language of hope, speaking of where signs of hope can be seen, and where the Church hopes transformation and change will occur. It is also hope that underpins and motivates Catholic social action, by refusing to accept that things must remain the way that they are."

Do encourage 13-18 year olds to enter our current Columban competition, 'JUBILEE: PILGRIMS OF HOPE,' which encourages them to identify Jubilee initiatives. Entry closes in three weeks' time, on 7 February.

COUNTING THE COST OF THE CLIMATE CRISIS

2024 was a year of climate extremes. From deadly floods in China and Brazil to devastating droughts in Zambia and record-breaking hurricanes in the Americas, the impacts of climate change have been impossible.

The ten most financially costly events all had an impact of more than \$4 billion. Most of these estimates are based only on insured losses, meaning the true financial costs are likely to be even higher, while the human costs are often uncounted.

Christian Aid's latest report: 'Counting the cost 2024: a year of climate breakdown' reveals the shocking cost of the world's worst claimed disasters.

No part of the world was spared from crippling climate disasters in 2024. Europe accounted for three of the top 10 costliest disasters with Storm Boris in central Europe and floods in Spain and Germany costing a combined \$13.87 billion and killing 258 people.

These extreme events highlight the need for more urgent action to reduce carbon emissions and accelerate the transition to renewable energy and underlines the importance of providing funding for vulnerable people.

CLIMATE AND NATURE BILL: AN 'HISTORIC' OPPORTUNITY, SAYS A ROCHA UK

A Rocha UK is supporting the Climate and Nature (CAN) Bill as it progresses through Parliament and nears a crucial stage, its second reading, on Friday 24 January 2025. The ecumenical Christian environmental charity says this will be "a huge day in Parliament, where the CAN Bill will be debated and voted on for the very first time."

"As Christians, God calls us to care for creation, and sometimes that means using our voices to call others to use their power to protect it as well," says A Rocha. "As the only proposed legislation before the UK Parliament that ensures a comprehensive and joined-up approach to the climate emergency and nature crisis, we want to pray and act so that it has the best opportunity to pass," it adds.

The cross-party CAN Bill - a private member's bill backed by 190+ MPs - is set to be debated in Parliament on Friday. It is now crucial to ensure that 102 MPs attend, and vote to progress the Bill. This will ensure that the Bill can continue its journey into law, but, if MPs fail to turn up, and fail to vote in favour, the Bill will fall.

A Rocha UK is also a lead organiser for a 45 minute prayer session on the day before - 23 January - to join with others to pray for the Bill to pass. "We will also pray more broadly for the care and preservation of God's creation and for those most affected by the devastating impacts of Climate Change," it says. The prayer will be held online 17.15pm - 18.00pm.
